

Six Holy Cross students won awards in The Governor's Cup district competition in Arts and Humanities, Composition, Language Arts, Social Studies and Math.

The Governor's Cup is a way to promote, reward and recognize outstanding academic achievement on the district, regional and state level. The competition is normally in February at the end of the Academic Team season.

The competition consists of several parts: Written Assessments, Composition and Quick Recall.

Written Assessments are multiple choice tests given to individual students in the areas of Math, Science, Social Studies, Language Arts, and Arts and Humanities.

Composition is on-demand writing based on a topic that is presented to the students at the time of the competition period.

Quick Recall has the same format as the Academic Team. It is similar in concept to the former television shows "It's Academic" and "College Bowl". Two teams of four players each answer questions based on Kentucky's school curricula. Players use a buzzer system and try to beat the clock – and the opposing team – to the correct answer. Questions are from the same subject areas as the written tests.

Students are selected by the faculty to compete in Written Assessments and Composition.

Students in Quick Recall are members of the Academic Team.

Schmidt Wins Harvard Model Congress Conference Speech Contest in San Francisco



Senior **Wesley Schmidt** won the Harvard Model Congress Conference speech contest on the theme of “A Future for Everyone.” He and other students and teachers headed to San Francisco for the conference in January.

Founded in 2001, HMCSF is one of the best civic engagement conferences under the umbrella organization of Harvard Model Congress, the nation’s oldest government simulation conference run exclusively by undergraduates at Harvard College. First and foremost a teaching insti-

tuition, HMC is also the most dynamic model congress simulation available to high school students.

Over the course of the four day conference, HMCSF offers students the unique opportunity to assume the role of real life senators, congressmen, and members of special programs to inspire debate, cooperation, and legislation--while also forcing students at the same time to expand their own perspectives and to understand the issues at hand in a new, more nuanced way.

They also played one of the toughest schedules in the state – CovCath (twice), Newport (3 times), Campbell Co, Scott, South Oldham, Holmes (twice), Beechwood, Scott Co and Lexington Christian Academy. This schedule prepared them for the 35th district tournament and regional tournaments.



GIRLS BASKETBALL ROUNDUP



The 2017-18 Holy Cross girls basketball team finished with a record of 18-13, despite a tough schedule that included a highly competitive Christmas tournament in Indiana and multiple games against Top 20 teams. Along the way, the Kes Murphy-coached Indians won the 9th Region All "A" Classic tournament for the third time in four years. In the state tournament at Eastern Ky., Holy Cross beat Danville by 17 and took a tie game into the 4th quarter before losing against eventual state champion and statewide Top 5 team Murray.

With a defense ranked 14th best in the state, the Indians made it to the 9th Region tournament for the fifth year in a row. Opening against Ryle (the region's No. 1 team), the Indians fell behind by 23 before a thrilling comeback that saw the Indians score 28 points in the 4th quarter. But they ran out of time and lost a heart-breaker, 60-58.

The future looks bright for the Indians. The 2017-18 team graduates only one senior, **Bailee Harney**. Many underclassmen got significant playing time and the freshman team won the regional tournament.

St. E's and The Reds Community Fund Help Equip HC Baseball and Softball Teams




In 2017, St. Elizabeth Healthcare, Pitch in for Baseball and the Cincinnati Reds Urban Academy established a program to provide much needed equipment to the baseball and fast pitch softball teams of five urban high schools in Northern Kentucky. Again In 2018, these corporate partners came together to help the schools only in a much bigger way. They expanded the number of schools from five to ten and the number of programs to twenty. The amount of money donated was also increased to \$20,000. Each team had players and coaches in attendance on Distribution Day.

The featured speaker was Red's right-handed pitcher Sal Romano. He talked about how lucky he was to play in the major league and how special it was to play high school baseball. Romano said he looked forward to competing for a spot in the Red's starting pitching rotation and to be a part of a team that wants to shed the "re-build" label and become a contender.

Pitch in for Baseball is a non-profit organization based in Philadelphia which collects and then distributes new and re-furbished baseball and fast pitch softball equipment and uniforms. Their targets are urban schools in many cities whose small athletic budgets barely cover basic expenses. Their goal is twofold: to get more urban kids playing high school baseball and to use baseball as a tool to keep them in school.

The Holy Cross Indians Baseball team is proud to announce the Holy Cross Diamond Club Class for 2018. Being inducted into this year's class are **Bob Bohman '65**, **Ray Hagedorn '65**, **Craig Craddock '00** and **Ryan Suckow '06**.

The induction ceremony will be held Saturday, April 21st, at Meinken Field, when the Indian's take on the Northwest Knights (OH) in a doubleheader. The ceremony itself will take place between games. The first game will start at 11:00am. The festivities should take place on the field at approximately 1:15.

INDUCTEES

Bob Bohman '65 was an outstanding all around player who played for the legendary coaches George Schneider and Tony Bezold. Bob could hit, run and play defense. In his junior season he led the team in hitting with a .507 batting average. Defensively, Bob played center field with great instincts. Add quickness and speed to his defensive prowess and Coach Schneider had a player who could run into the deepest of alleys in right and left centerfield.

Ray Hagedorn '65 also played for Coaches' Schnieder and Bezold. Ray, along with Bohman, were the offensive centerpieces of the 1964-65 seasons. Hagedorn was a standout hitter for the Indians. His best season as a hitter was his junior year in 1964 when he hit .357. His greatest asset was his defensive skills behind the plate. He caught in all twenty-one

games in 1964 and made only four errors. Ray had the gift of being a quality receiver but was invaluable in work with a very young and inexperienced pitching staff.

Craig Craddock '00 was a fleet footed centerfielder. He was that great combination of speed, power and skill. During the 2000 season, the Indian pitching staff was hit hard by injuries. Yet, the Indians were an offensive juggernaut and Craig was the catalyst. His speed and quickness on the base paths terrorized opposing pitchers. Craig was the leading base stealer on a team that swiped more than 100 bases that season. Not to be overlooked was his defensive play in centerfield. Craig's range and arm strength eliminated many scoring threats.

Ryan Suckow '06 was a three year varsity starter for the Indians. He was one of the top catchers in the region during both his junior and senior seasons and when he wasn't catching Ryan was one of the area's best defensive outfielders. His greatest asset was handling the Indian pitching staff and calling the game. He caught many on the Indian staff for many summers growing up and developed a knack for working with each pitcher's strengths against opposing teams. Ryan was also a good hitting catcher finishing his career with a .317 batting average, with a single season high of .383.


Our Mission

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

A Tribute to Clay Eifert

Eulogy written and read by **Danny Trame '80** at Clay Eifert's funeral



Welcome everyone, the Eifert and Mai families, Clay's friends, students, players, and all those who were lucky enough to know and love him. Welcome to this tribute to our friend, Clay Eifert. Earlier this week, Brian Fischer and Gary Bamberger were discussing the article written about Clay by Dan Hassert. Fisch and Bam both agreed that while the article was outstanding, it still fell short of who Clay is, the impact he has made, and what he accomplished in 55 years of life. Just like whatever I say today is going to fall woefully short as well. This is for my friend, Clay.

On behalf of Gay and I, our family, and this entire community of Holy Cross, of Latonia, and all of Northern Kentucky, we express our most heartfelt condolences to Lori, Ashley, Jake, and Robert, as well as the entire Eifert Family.

I am honored and humbled beyond words to be asked to deliver Clay's Tribute. Clay requested two things, #1 to talk about his family, and #2, to make it a happy tribute. The first, no problem, the second, I'll do my best.

I will spend the time talking about Clay in the following areas, his family, his childhood and school life, his friends, his courtship and marriage to Lori, the arrival of Ashley and Robert, his teaching, his coaching, his time as principal of Holy Cross, and his long battle with cancer.

THE EIFERT FAMILY

Directly behind us is the street recently named Eifert Way. Whenever I see that street sign, I never think of the alley behind church, but rather I think of the Eifert way of life. The Eifert family is, and has always been a family of service ...service to Holy Cross, service to Latonia, and service to the people of Northern Kentucky. Their lives have been spent improving the lives of others by word and by action. Their impact in law enforcement, education, nursing, advocating for the homeless, and other areas of service has improved and touched the lives of so many of us. The Eiferts are a family of givers. That is the Eifert Way!

CLAY EIFERT'S LIFE AND IMPACT

Clay Eifert was born on July 4th, 1962, the son of Mary and Paul Eifert, and brother of Paul, Theresa, Connie, and Susan, before him, then Veronica after, and grew up on Summit Dr., back here across the railroad tracks. Clay said he had the coolest childhood ever. He called his dad his hero. Paul Eifert taught Clay how to be a person of principle, to be proud of the Eifert name, and the importance of conducting himself properly. Clay's dad had high expectations of his children. In school, A's were expected, B's were accepted, C's were rejected. While Mr. Eifert could have an imposing presence about him, Clay's mom, Mary, was the disciplinarian. When Clay was in trouble, Paul would stay calm, but Mary would go crazy on Clay. She would tell Clay that when adversity strikes, you either crawl into the fetal position or you pick yourself up and move forward. We've heard Clay use that line on many occasions. Mary worried about her son and predicted that Clay would either be a blackjack dealer in Las Vegas or a juggler in the circus.

When Clay was of school age, he did not attend kindergarten due to the arrival of Veronica, whom he dubbed the golden child. Clay's initial school experience was the first grade at 8th District. He wanted nothing to do with it. He would sneak out of school and walk over to Haggis' Restaurant, which is now Lynna's Grill. He would sit at the bar stool with construction workers and garbage collectors. He wanted to be just like them. Clay also liked to wander down to Twin Oaks and hunt golf balls. When he was not home at the appointed time, Mary would call Twin Oaks and he could be found sitting on a bar stool with all the golfers.

Clay entered Holy Cross as a 2nd grader, and his whole life changed. Clay enjoyed Holy Cross, but there was a problem, he was way behind his classmates and was labeled "special."

Different terms were probably used back then. So Connie and Sue took it upon themselves to catch Clay up by teaching him his letters, numbers, and colors. Well his sisters did a tremendous job. By high school, Clay was near the top of his class.

He thrived in high school where he said he developed many life-long friendships. Here's a short list of some of Clay's friends: Bam Bam, Fisch, Firehead, Smitty, Lenny, Drew, Whales, Monkey, Stork, Bate, Swish, Stinky, and Goone to name a few. What a cast of characters!! Yet somehow Clay found a way to rise above us all.

As a student, Clay always went above and beyond what was required. Unlike most of us, he really seemed to enjoy the classroom. His life would be positively affected by outstanding teachers and phenomenal people, the likes of Bill Goller, Jim McDonough, Fr. Robbins, John Wysong, and Mary Beth Livingston to name a few, but he developed a real soft spot for the hermanas, Sister Samuel and Sister Carmella. Clay was a notorious suckup to the hermanas. They loved it and they loved him.

Aside from his academic excellence, Clay was a force to be reckoned with on the basketball court and baseball field. As a basketball player, Clay was somebody's injury waiting to happen, a physical bruiser with sharp elbows and not afraid to use them. He was a relentless rebounding machine. But what really distinguished Clay was his ability to shoot the basketball. A 6'6" lefty, Clay was a sharpshooter from any distance, and particularly lethal at the free throw line. Clay was the MVP of the very first All A Classic in 1980, played right over here in our gym. He was an all-region performer that year as well.

In baseball, Clay played first base. It was a great comfort and assurance for us infielders, Bam Bam, Dan Niehaus, Dan Lenihan, Marty Fritsch, and myself to have such a big and reliable target to throw to, knowing that if you got it near him, he would catch it. The 1980 baseball regular season was rather mediocre and we entered district play with a sub .500 record. However, Clay hit a 3 run triple to help defeat CovCath in the Districts, singled in the winning run in the 8th inning to beat Simon Kenton in the first round of the regional, then, in the regional finals, beat Lloyd, 1-0, with a solo home run over the trees in right centerfield at Boone Co. High School, sending the Indians to the state tournament, and authoring what has become known as the Miracle on Dirt. Every game ended with a dog pile victory celebration. I laugh when I look at the pictures of those victory celebrations with us little guys hanging onto Clay. To my teammates on that team, especially to you Clay, thank you for that incredible ride, and a life time of unforgettable memories.

Clay graduated from Holy Cross at the top of his class and enrolled at Thomas More College. His athletic career would end due to foot problems. With all his successes as

a player and a coach, Clay was inducted into the Northern Kentucky Sports Hall of Fame, the Northern Kentucky Athletic Director's Sports Hall of Fame, and would certainly be a member of the Holy Cross Sports Hall of Fame, but has refused induction so that others may have that honor instead of him. Imagine that, Clay putting other people before himself. At Thomas More, Clay earned a degree in Accounting along with a teaching degree and starting teaching at Holy Cross in 1986, Veronica's senior year.

It was during this time, that Clay was introduced by Mary Jill Schlarman to a beautiful young lady by the name of Lori Mai, at the old Burgundy's Night Club in 1983. They dated for two years, were engaged for one, and on June 14th, 1986, Clay and Lori were married right here at this altar. They have been married and best friends for going on 32 years.

Clay began coaching girls basketball at Holy Cross in 1982, starting the freshmen program, then moving to JV through 1987. He switched to the boys program in '88 where he helped my brother Jeff's '91 team win the 9th Region in a miraculous double overtime win over Holmes, then ultimately all the way to the state semi-finals at Rupp Arena. Jeff said that there's no way that would've happened if not for Clay's game planning and expertise in preparing the Indians for those post-season games.

Clay took over the boys program from 1994-99. His first team, the '94 team was dominant, capturing the 9th Region Championship and advancing to the state quarter finals at



Freedom Hall. His '96 team pulled one of the great regional upsets of all time, knocking off regional favorite Holmes in the first round. His '99 team, his final, won the 9th region All A Classic. Clay's basketball teams took on his personality. They were physically and mentally tough, and prided themselves on playing hard and playing for each other. His teams were very difficult to play and coach against. Clay also gained the reputation of being the most animated coach in Northern Kentucky. His sideline rants, facial expressions, and gyrations are legendary. Clay also served as head baseball coach from 1986 - 1994. But he does not want to be remembered as a coach.

He loved teaching, and he loved every student. Clay wants to be remembered as a teacher and, more importantly, as a family man. Lori and Clay adopted Ashley at birth on July 10, 1992, then adopted Robert at birth on November 7, 1997. Clay said those years were very special. They were living in the Bamberger's old house on Southern Ave. Lori was staying at home with Ashley, they had no money. They would roll nickels to get milk. But they had a lot of fun together, and he wouldn't trade those years for anything. Ashley and Robert, your dad wanted you to know that there is no possible way he could ever love you more if you were his biological children. You, along with your mom, were the light of his life and his pride and joy. He's so proud of you both!

It was around this time that Clay talked his sister, Susan, into leaving Notre Dame to teach at Holy Cross. They had a special and unique relationship. Sue and Clay mentored each other. Sue gave Clay the confidence to pursue the principal's position. Clay donated his sick days for Sue when her daughter, Molly, was having health issues. Sue coined the famous phrase that Clay would quote so often, "Holy Cross is a place that demands everything you can give, accepts no less, and in return, gives you undying loyalty and friendship." Sue was a special soul and her loss is still profoundly felt.

In the classroom, Clay's antics are legendary, not to mention hilarious. He had such a passion to teach, and wanted so badly for his students to learn, sometimes his emotions would get the best of him. Like the day he was teaching in Mrs. Stropko's room, and his students were not engaged in his lesson to his liking, so he walked over to Mrs. Stropko's world map and started ripping it apart, country by country, telling students they need to move there!

We can all picture him doing it. It has never been confirmed nor denied that he once held a student out the window of the old building by his ankles but my personal favorite took place in the cafeteria. I witnessed this one. It was early in the school year. Clay was patrolling the lunch room and was advising some new freshmen about what was acceptable behavior. As he ended his instructions, this little freshmen boy replied to him, "OK Bull," in reference to Bull



Shannon, the tall, bald-headed courtroom officer on the TV show Night Court. Well, his buddies laughed and so did Clay, but the kid did not let up. Every time Clay said something, the kid continued to reply, "OK Bull." Well I could see Clay starting to get agitated and I could sense that this was going to end badly, so I walked up to the teachers' lunchroom because I didn't want to witness the carnage. About two minutes later, I could hear Clay screaming. Then I watched him walk past the teachers' lunchroom with this poor freshman hanging over his shoulder. Clay took him out the front door and sat him on the steps, went in and called his dad to pick him up. We never saw that kid again.

At about this time, the efforts of Big G and Ted Arlinghaus had resurrected the high school. Enrollment was growing and all along, G was grooming Clay for the principal's job. After his last coaching season, Clay completed his master's in education administration at Xavier, then took over as the principal of Holy Cross District High School in 2001-02, a position he would hold through the 2013 school year. Clay was principal, but he also taught class, served as business manager, remodeled the old building, worked on sports nights, and wore several other hats. It was during these years that the high school enrollment grew to its highest levels in history, with all classes numbering well over 100 students. So how did this happen??

Well, Big G and Clay had hired a tremendous faculty. Buildings were being remodeled, property was being purchased, the academic enhancement program was incorporated and led by



Sue, then Anne Julian and Sister Sharon, the football program had been started by Coach Wysong and Coach Koz, so there was a lot of exciting things going on. But to me, the underlying reason for the unparalleled growth of Holy Cross District High School was Clay Eifert – his passion, his vision, his leadership ability, and his charismatic personality that magnetized and energized people. When he spoke about Holy Cross, it stirred your passion and made you a believer.

Steve Siebert described this perfectly. Steve and his wife Lori attended a high school open house in the cafeteria. They had no ties to Holy Cross, they were just looking for the best high school fit for their kids. Steve said that after they heard Clay speak about this school, he knew that Holy Cross was the place for their children. Clay just had that rare charisma about him. How many of us could say no to Clay? Whenever he asked for your money, you opened your wallets. Your talents, your time, or your resources, to all of it you said, “Yes.” He made you believe in his vision for this school. And what was that vision?

Clay wanted every kid who desired it, to have an outstanding Catholic education, tailored to their individual needs, with Jesus Christ at the forefront. He wanted every kid to have every opportunity to participate in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities, and to have spiritual opportunities and guidance, regardless of their ability to pay for it. Clay was most proud of the fact that he never turned away or dismissed one student for financial reasons. He would do

whatever he possibly could to save a student. So many of our own kids were going through the high school at this time, and believe me, it was special!!

We all hoped that this would continue indefinitely. But God had different plans. In June of 2010, Clay was diagnosed with the disease of melanoma. There began a nearly 8 year battle with this despicable disease, chemo and radiation treatments, surgeries, an 8 year rollercoaster ride of emotions, lows and highs, setbacks and victories.

Through it all, Lori, you have been a champion. We can't begin to imagine what the last 8 years have been like for you, but the love, the care, and the support that you and the family have shown Clay has been inspirational to all of us. I remember going to Christ Hospital last year as Clay was receiving treatment. I witnessed you asking questions, getting instructions, and taking notes on how you were going to take care of Clay at home. What a moving display of love. You've done all this while earning your bachelor's degree and carving out your own career of aiding the cause of the homeless and less fortunate. This extraordinary man was blessed with a most extraordinary wife! Thank you Lori, as well as all the family, for taking such great care of our friend for these many years.

And through these years, Clay, ever the teacher, continued to show us how to deal with the adversities of his fading health. Clay vowed to live every day to the fullest. He would offer his pain and suffering for the poor souls in purgatory, that his suffering would allow their souls to go to heaven. Clay said that because God allowed him to endure his pain and suffering, he would attain certain graces. That those graces would lift him up when he was stripped of his abilities to do the things in life that feed our egos, that in these difficult times, one finds out what is truly important in life. What a great lesson for all of us.

They say the best thing that can be said of a person is that they were significant to other people, that they bettered the lives of others through word and through deed. That is the essence of the life of Clay Eifert. Recently John Pohlman posted, “Clay, when I think of you, I think of a loving, supportive, encouraging, humble, Christian role model with a sincere heart, deep faith, tremendous strength, grace, dignity, intelligence. I and thousands are blessed for having known you and the example you've provided to all of us.”

Our son, Blair Trame, recently wrote this to Clay: “Dear Mr. Eifert, I remember when my brother, Brandon, was quite young and said, ‘If Clay Eifert played for a baseball team, it would be the San Francisco Giants.’ You are a giant to me. You have always been a role model to me, someone I aspired to be like. You have a presence about you that makes those around you want to make you proud. That's why you were born to be the principal of our school. You inspire me to be the type of leader you are and make the type of impact you have.”

Clay's daughter Ashley said, "Our dad was the type of father whose children never had to question if they were loved or protected. He genuinely enjoyed spending time with us, even into adulthood. He made sure we knew we always had a place to come home to. He even went as far as to offer money and bribes to live with him forever!"

And lastly, Clay's wife, Lori, shared, "Although Clay presented a commanding presence, he was really a gentle giant. Not a day went by where he didn't tell me or the kids how much he loved us. He was my best friend, a loving father, and a wonderful husband. After God made Clay, the mold was broken."

These testimonials tell the story – That you, Clay Eifert, husband, father, brother, uncle, student, teammate, teacher, coach, principal, and friend, are, and always will be, significant to countless numbers of people.

So, as we continue to celebrate Clay's extraordinary life, what can we do to always honor his memory and his

contributions to this community?? First, we need to love, support, and pray for Lori, Ashley, Jake, and Robert, and the entire Eifert family. Secondly, I suggest that we begin to, or we continue to, do a better job of supporting his mission, which is the mission of Holy Cross, and the mission which principal Mike Holtz ably and passionately continues today, which is to provide opportunities for all students to attend this magnificent high school, to support endowments, and to give of our time, our talents, and our resources to ensure that Clay's mission and passion for Holy Cross never dies.

I end now with the way we always broke our huddles when playing basketball for Holy Cross and in honor of Clay's favorite saint. "Mary Queen of Victory, Pray for Us, St. Jude, Pray for Us!!"

And now, we'll play the song "Hallelujah." It was one of Clay's favorites. Lori played it for him as he crossed from this life to eternal life.


